Medical Equipment Repair Training School

Today, I'll take a breather from writing about 'Monthly Observances' and do a piece for our guests from the Rotary Club of Modesto, California. For the information of our new members and our 'not-so-new' members who are 'MULTO' (Making Up a Little Too Often in other clubs), the Rotary Club of Modesto, California, is one of our partners in the 3-H Grant # 01-1200- the Medical Equipment Repair Training School Project. This project is, in terms of budget, the largest one ever undertaken by District 3790. The Grant amounts to 421,375 US dollars and an additional Gift-In-Kind costing 300,000 US dollars. This is besides the 25,000 dollars combined contribution by our Club, the RC of Manila & RC Modesto.

This project was conceived during PP Albert Dy's term by PP Rufi Macagba Jr. and his counterparts in the RC of Modesto California and the RC of Manila. These were Rotarians Michael Keckler and Jose 'Peping' Tamayo, respectively. Also involved is International Aid (IA) an organization which provides various services for countries in the Developing World. IA had already set up pilot Medical Equipment Repair Training Programs in Accra, Ghana 1998, and in Bangalore, India, 1999. In charge is Bill Teninty of IA, now with our Club.

The 3-H Grant Project was put into motion during my term as President. During IPP Richard's term, the project expanded to Laguna & Sorsogon. I had expressed my enthusiasm to PP Rufi, when he mentioned the idea of putting up such a school, the first of its kind in the country. As a Radiologist, I deal with expensive Medical equipment and I have stories to tell about machines becoming 'white elephants' if malfunction occurs w/ no trained personnel to do repairs. 'Maintainance contracts' w/ dealers of these equipment often cost an 'arm and a leg'. If the equipment is a donation no one will take care of maintainance! Such a 'Horror Story' occurred in the early 1990's, involving our

Club. I wasn't yet a Rotarian but I was familiar with the details, since I was then Head of the Radiology Dept. of the Ilocos Regional Hospital or IRH (now known as Ilocos Training and Regional Medical Center or ITRMC). I don't want to open old wounds, so no names will be mentioned. IRH received a new 1000 MA X-ray unit from the RC of Malta through the efforts of a DG there. Donation was through the RC of Makati which then contacted one of the Clubs here in LU, which then involved the Mother Club. Members of our Club decided to make the donation to IRH. Since there was no room for the unit, I suggested to our Hosp. Chief that we donate our old 500 MA unit to a District Hospital to make way for the new one. The remaining problem was 'installation'. The unit was a 'Philips' so the company was contacted but they gave a high 'quotation' for installation. Then a Rotarian, or rather pseudo-Rotarian, classified as Biomedical Engineer in one of the LU Clubs, offered to do the service for a reduced sum. Members of the different RC's here passed the 'hat' around & came up with the sum. The pseudo-Rotarian took the sum, installed the unit in time for a successful program involving officers of the DOH, the DG from Malta, officers of RC Makati, leaders of our District & L.U. Rotarians. Despite program's success, the unit never worked. The pseudo-Rotarian left LU, present whereabouts unknown after I filed a 'case' against him. Our Dept. suffered because we replaced a functioning machine with a 'dud'. After no one could make the machine from Malta functional (Philips, their offer spurned, did not want to help), we decided to dismantle and return it. This might not have happened had trained people been around. So thanks to our friends from Modesto for helping make the 'school' a reality. They are true Rotarians who 'make-up' for the harm 'pseudo-Rotarians' & 'pseudo-human beings' do.



Oasis in the Desert
