WORLD ROTARACT WEEK

Most organizations which are serious about making an impact on the community and which intend to remain vibrant for a long time have a strong Youth component. For the Lions Club there is the Leo Club, for the Knights of Columbus there are the Squires, for the Red Cross it is the Red Cross Youth Organization, and for The Couples for Christ they have the KFC- Kids for Christ and not Kentucky Fried Chicken!

For Rotary we have the Rotaract and the Interact Clubs. Rotaract Clubs are clubs composed of young adults 18-30 years of age, residing, employed or studying within the vicinity of the sponsoring Rotary Club. Usually, Rotaract Clubs are based in a College although there are clubs which are community-based. Interact Clubs, meanwhile, are clubs for young people ages ranging from 14-18 years. They are usually based in Secondary schools, although they can also be community-based. Today we are celebrating World Rotaract Week, celebrated on the week when March 13 falls (this year it is March 9-15). This is to commemorate the official chartering of the first Rotaract Club in North Charlotte, North Carolina, in 1968. World Interact Week, on the other hand, is celebrated on the week when November 5 falls, to commemorate the establishment of the first Interact Club in Melbourne, Florida, in 1962. Even before these dates, however, youth organizations have already been unofficially affiliated to Rotary. Organizations like the Ro Club which has a Charter very similar to that of Interact. Also, there was the Yrator (Rotary spelled backwards) Club, active during the 1930's. For more information about the history, goals and organizational details of the two Youth organizations affiliated with Rotary, I refer you to the Rotary Primer & the Rotaract and Interact Websites. Before going further, I also want to make a suggestion. Why not a Rotary-affiliated organization for Elementary School kids? The Boy and Girl Scout Organizations are alone in helping schools & the gov't in instilling civic-mindedness in young kids.

The reason why a youth component is necessary in keeping organizations from going stale

is because young people are idealistic and full of energy. The last syllable in Rotaract and Interact aptly describe the youth. They like to 'act' rather than just plan or contemplate matters. This activism gets things done. Of course, if a 'mature' organization is around to offer guidance, then so much the better. A few meetings ago, we had a discussion on whether we should elect a separate Youth Service Director. This is so our Club could better oversee our Youth-oriented projects. The motion to elect a separate Youth Service Director was temporarily shelved pending clarification of matters of legal and procedural significance. At any rate, it is important that we touch base with the Youth Sector whether we do it officially or unofficially. Furthermore, I must emphasize that Youth Service is not just engaging in projects which benefit young people, like our Polio immunization and Vit. A projects. It is giving young people a chance to participate in community building. Leadership seminars are okay but there is nothing like an actual project to teach a person about leadership! It may be a little late to involve our Rotaractors and Interactors based in LORMA and UCC in our projects since final exams are around the corner but just to remind future Officers- the Charters of these clubs require them to engage in at least 2 service projects before the Rotaract/Interact Year ends.

As Editor-in-Chief of the Goldleaf, I was also amiss in involving the Youth. An innovation for succeeding years is to have sections or issues of our newsletter to be put out by our Rotaractors/Interactors (The Goldleaflet?). You would be surprised at the wisdom which at times emanates from the "mouths of babes!"

Let's not forget our young people lest we lose them to inane computer games or worse, to drugs and crime. Other organizations wishing to create an 'impact' on society are busy recruiting youngsters, albeit unofficially. These are organizations like the Red Scorpion and Akyat-Bahay Gangs, the Oxo and Sigue-sigue Sputnik, the Pentagon and Kuratong Baleleng. Depriving them of future members by involving the young in worthwhile activities is a non-violent and legal way of killing off these 'scourges'.

AMENDING PROCEDURE OF THE CONSTITUTION

No Constitution, however gifted its framers, is likely to prove adequate for an indefinite period. There are problems that no human foresight can anticipate. As conditions are never static, so must the fundamental law be freed from the constraint of rigidity. While it is reduced to writing, it should not be devoid of the element of flexibility. Thus, a well-written charter must not only safeguard individual rights and organize the government but indicate how it may be amended in order to make it responsive to changing economic, social and political conditions.

Not much reflection is needed to show that without an amending process, the only alternative to bring about the necessary changes would be through revolution. In this way, the article on amendments provides a safety valve.

METHODS BY WHICH AMENDMENTS OR REVISION MAY BE PROPOSED.

Section 1 and 3 prescribed three (3) methods for proposing any amendment to, or revision of the Constitution, namely:

1. By Congress, as a constituents assembly, upon a voter of three-fourths of all its members (Sec. 1(a)), voting separately.
2. By a constitutional convention called for the purpose (Sec. 1 (2)), or
3. By the people directly, through initiative upon petition of the required number of registered voters. (Sec. 2 par. 1).

It is to be noted that the vote requirement is more stringent if the amendments are proposed by Congress itself. This is to insure more deliberations and deeper study and considerations of the merits of the proposed changes in the fundamental law.


