ROTARY AND THE ELDERLY

“ Old age is a shipwreck!”
-Charles De Gaulle

The author of the above quotation is probably the most prominent Frenchman of the 20th century. A hero of the First World War, he was a maverick military commander in the post-war period whose ideas clashed with the Establishment. Proven right during the Second World War when France quickly fell to the Germans despite the Maginot Line, he fled to England and became the rallying point of the Free French Movement. He led the French Army through the ‘Arc de Triomphe’ after the Germans were defeated and became Premier of France. He resigned his post shortly after his provisions for the new Constitution were rejected. He returned during the Algerian Crisis of 1961 and became President for two terms, charting an independent course for France. Retiring from public life a little frustrated in 1968, he died in his home in 1970. It was during his last years that he penned the above quote.

I know of several other very dynamic men who became pitiful shadows of themselves in old age. We have former US President Ronald Reagan, who is now suffering from Alzheimer’s disease. We have our own Emilio Aguinaldo, commander of our forces against the Spaniards and the Americans but who then sided with the Japanese in WWII. He had a hard time in the late 1950’s and early 1960’s answering questions from journalists about the deaths of his rivals, Andres Bonifacio and Antonio Luna, reputedly on his orders. I guess he made the mistake of living too long. No wonder Jose Rizal and Ninoy Aquino preferred early martyrdom to the prospect of old age.

I’m still young and I’ve never been in a shipwreck but I can imagine what De Gaulle meant. Unable to move around when I suffered hypokalemia, I became utterly dependent on others for the simplest things. This is not unlike being at the mercy of the waves, as depicted in movies like the Poseidon Adventure, Titanic and Cast Away.

But I guess, the worst thing about old age is when you are neglected, taken for granted and left to suffer desolation.

This first week of October, various national organizations like the DOH , place the spotlight on the Elderly. Right now about 5-6% of our population is above 60 years of age. This is still a far cry from the 14-18% for the U.S.A. and 21-26% for Japan. But remember, these countries have much better retirement benefits than our own. As a character in Tennessee William’s “ Cat on a Hot Tin Roof” said, “ to be young and poor is alright but to be old and poor is hell!” Remember too, that our young nurses and therapists are rushing to the developed countries where they earn a lot taking care of their old people. So, perhaps Elderly Filipinos made the mistake of living too long and being born in the wrong country.

Rotary can help in the plight of the neglected Elderly in three ways. One is by our usual short-term projects, like Medical Missions, sponsoring recreational activities for Elderly and providing a forum where old people can share their plight and also their wisdom with the young. The second is by supporting government initiatives for old people, like the bill authored by Senator Angara requiring business establishments to give discounts to those with Senior Citizen’s I.D’s. This was passed into law but is hardly followed at all. Our Club should campaign for compliance. Lastly, remember that within Rotary Clubs, like our own, the Senior members are still given fruitful roles to play in community-building. At least in Rotary, fulfillment through service is not limited by age.

The communists theorize that when the ‘ poor and subjugated’ classes violently clash with the ‘rich and ruling’ classes, a ‘classless’ society would emerge. This has not been proven true in practice. A more promising theory is that when the ‘young’ generation meaningfully interacts with the ‘older’ generation, an ‘ageless’ generation, full of wisdom and vitality, arises! Just look at our Rotary Club.
